

Maria Teresa Monti is full professor of History of Science at the University of East Piedmont (Department of Humanities, Vercelli). In 1979 she graduated in Philosophy, and from 1984 to 2006 she was a research fellow at ISPF/CNR (Milan). She is the secretary and treasurer of the Edizione Nazionale delle Opere di Antonio Vallisneri, and she is a member of the National Commission and of the Executive Committee of this institution. She is also involved in the Scientific Committee of the Edizione Nazionale delle Opere di Lazzaro Spallanzani. She is a member of the direction committee of “Medicina&Storia” and of the scientific board of the “Rivista di Storia della Filosofia”. For years, she has been cooperating with the Institutes for the History of Medicine of Geneva University, Lausanne University and Berne University, as well as with the “Société d’Histoire et Epistémologie des Sciences de la Vie”, of which she was vice-chairperson. She was the scientific director of many conferences and seminars, and she is a member of the Direction Committee of BIOM (Società italiana per la storia, filosofia e studi sociali della biologia e della medicina). Her main research interests focus on the history of medicine and of life sciences in the Early Modern period. She developed her studies along two main paths: 1) structures and methods of bio-medical sciences; 2) literary, material and social technologies of inventing, communicating and confirming theories and procedures. She has published several papers and books on scientists (Haller, Spallanzani, Vallisneri), “networks” (the “good science” in Italy during the *Ancien Regime*) and institutions (the case study of Habsburg Lombardy). Moreover, she has been actively involved in critical editions of three forms of scientific communication: printed essays, correspondences and notebooks. She has directed and has been referee for a number of international research projects, and she has been engaged in many promotion activities about science and its history.
